Trip to Apple Orchard Mountain on May 4

Dick Rowe will again lead us on our annual half-day excursion to Apple Orchard Mountain to welcome back wood warblers and other spring migrants. There are two options for joining the trip: meet at the Lexington Food Lion parking lot at 6:30 a.m. to caravan to the Parkway, or meet the group at 7:30 a.m. at the Sunset Fields pull-off (mile marker 78.4). From there, we'll follow the access road on foot to the top of Apple Orchard Mountain, a gradual up-and-back walk of approximately two miles, stopping often to look and listen. We'll return to Lexington mid-afternoon.

We look forward to hearing a variety of wood warblers and catching glimpses of them as they flit through the trees, and we're likely to see returning Vireos, Tanagers, and Rose-breasted Grosbeaks.

Help Spring Migrating Birds


Spring migration is well underway, and there are a few steps we all can take to help birds get safely to where they are going.

Some 2.5–3.5 billion birds will fly northward to their breeding grounds in the United States and Canada – in the dark. That's why it is critical to reduce lighting at night and treat window glass so that birds can see it and avoid collisions.

To help prevent such collisions, turn out non-essential lighting from 11:00 pm to 6:00 pm, or draw curtains to keep light inside. Modify external lighting with shields to direct light downward. Continue taking these steps from mid-February to mid-June (and again during fall migration) to help protect migrating birds.

Want to track which birds are flying over your roof during spring migration? Visit the <u>BirdCast website</u>, which provides real-time predictions of bird migrations: when they migrate, where they migrate, and how far they will be flying.


